Spring 2013 GIS Workshop Series



Chis Gist and Kelly Johnston have been offering a GIS workshop series each spring and fall for several years now. The workshop sessions are designed to be accessible without prior knowledge or experience with GIS software and to give attendees hands-on experience with step-by-step instructions.

Workshop topics are based on the how-to questions Kelly and Chris answer daily in their interactions with faculty and students in the Scholars' Lab, in addition to emerging themes in geospatial scholarship.

The Fall workshop series always starts with *Making Your First Map*, as basic introduction to GIS where students create several basic maps over the course of an

hour, and goes on to cover many of the topics typically seen in a semester-long *Intro to GIS* course such as adding X,Y data, geocoding, georeferencing, editing vector data, and working with GPS.

Spring workshops go beyond these basics. This semester's workshop topics, chosen based on interest from the UVa GIS community, include Neatline, cartograms, open source GIS tools QGIS and GDAL, watershed delineation, and working with US census data.

The Spring GIS workshop series began the week of February 4.
